KEYNOTE SPEAKER

DREW G.I. HART

Introduced by Dr. Linda Thomas Worthy

Drew G. I. Hart is an author, activist, and professor in theology in the Bible and Religion department at Messiah University with ten years of pastoral experience. Hart majored in Biblical Studies at Messiah College as an undergrad, he attained his MDiv with an urban concentration from Biblical Theological Seminary, and he received his PhD in theology and ethics from Lutheran Theological Seminary-Philadelphia.



ADULT/TEEN TRACK

Dr. Hart's dissertation considered how Christian discipleship, as framed by Black theologies and contemporary Anabaptism, gesture the western Church towards untangling the forces of white supremacy and the inertia of western Christendom which have plagued its witness in society for too long. As two traditions that emerged from the underside of violent and oppressive western Christian societies, he found Black theologies and Anabaptism each repeatedly turning to the particularity of Jesus in the gospel narratives, ultimately calling for an ethic of liberation in the Black Church and an ethic of peacemaking in the Anabaptist tradition. Hart finds the practice of reading Jesus not only for the Church, but also against it, to be a vital dimension in salvaging western Christianity from itself.

His work beyond teaching and writing has included pastoring in Harrisburg and Philadelphia, working for an inner-city afterschool program for black and brown middle school boys, delivering lectures and leading anti-racism workshops, collaborating with faith-based organizers in his neighborhood, and doing a broad range of public theology. Hart sees his current role as a theology professor as an extension of his ministry vocation that began with pastoral leadership.

Trouble I've Seen: Changing the Way the Church Views Racism by Drew Hart, was chosen as a 2016 book of the month by Englewood Review of Books. Reviewing the book, Shane Claiborne said, "This book is a gift from the heart of one of the sharpest young theologians in the United States. Hold it carefully, and allow it to transform you—and our blood-stained streets." As a text, Trouble I've Seen utilizes personal and everyday stories, Jesus-shaped theological ethics, and anti-racism frameworks to transform the church's understanding and witness.

Dr. Drew Hart was recently the recipient of bcmPEACE's 2017 Peacemaker Award for his local and national work. You can find some of Hart's writing at his blog entitled 'Taking Jesus Seriously' which is hosted at <u>The Christian Century</u>, or you can catch him as he travels and speaks regularly across the country to colleges, conferences, and churches. Drew and Renee, and their three boys (Micah, Dietrich, and Vincent) live in Harrisburg.

The DOC Mime Ministry's mission is to win souls for Christ through body language, expression, and mime. *History:*

Gospel mime comes out of a rich history of spiritual expression that stretches back centuries in America and Africa. Whereas traditional gospel performances are structured around live vocal and instrumental performances, Gospel Mime blends non-verbal communication with pre-recorded gospel music. As a ministry, Gospel Mime expands the line of liturgical song and dance, which has been an important part of Black Christian worship services since the 1970s, and has sparked debate about the role of dance and the body in worship practices.



DR. FELICIA BROWN-HAYWOOD

Dr. Brown-Haywood (affectionately known as Dr. Felicia) is an educator, a mentor, an inspirational speaker and a servant leader who contributes her life's foundation to her mother who instilled in her a faith tradition that shows love and "uplifting" for all people. She believes that it is important to grow with S.T.Y.L.E. Substantive Tools that Yield Leadership Enhancement. It is her belief that everyone has S.T.Y.L.E. and the ability to lead on their life's journey and or the ability to assist others on their leadership journey, if given the proper access to requisite resources. When asked how she describes herself, she responds by saying, "as a woman who serves on purpose for the purpose of community building through the lens of equity and social justice." She is the CEO/founder and lead counselor/consultant for Harvest 3 Gathering LLC – Counseling~Coaching~Consulting.

Dr. Brown-Haywood has earned her multiple degrees, licenses, & certifications including Inter-Cultural Communications and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion in the Workplace from Cornell University, and Certificate from the University of Cape Town in South Africa for Executive Management and Leadership Coaching coursework. She currently serves as the Vice President of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusive Excellence at Lebandon Valley College.



ADULT/TEEN TRACK Prior to this assignment, she served as Chief Diversity Officer for Millersville University and in various positions at Penn State University – Harrisburg Campus for 35 years. She was in the role of Senior Director of Student Affairs and Engagement when she retired from Penn State University.

Dr. Brown-Haywood has been the recipient of many distinguished community awards and has sung all over the east coast in reputable venues, such as Carnegie Hall. Dr. Felicia completed and published her first book/journal titled "My Tee Shirt Is Speaking" a strength-based journal that shares the transforming voices of women through their testimonies; the book is available on Amazon.com. She has also graced the community with her soulful captivating singing voice in a CD project titled "Singing My Way Through In Sacred Face: The Healing Properties of African American Spirituals.

Dr. Felicia chaired the Race Against Racism Committee, sponsored by the Y.W.C.A. of Greater Harrisburg for three consecutive years. Dr. Felicia is a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc. and served as Chaplin for three consecutive years. She also served on the Dauphin County Systems of Care Parent Advisory Committee. In addition to her most recent publications listed above she also co-authored The Intersecting Roles Religion, Culture and Spirituality – Book Chapter in Feminist Popular Education – Internationally (2011) (co-authored) and "The Living Colors of Transformation in Education: Multi-dimensional and Cultural Perspective is featured in the 2006 Transformative Learning Journal - (co-authored). She has also served as a contributing writer for Harrisburg's premier woman's magazine -Women Connect. Dr. Felicia is a national workshop facilitator with in Transforming Leadership, areas Empowerment, and Planting Life Skills for Living.
